Hello dear SMLC Family and friends!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Der Herr ist auferstanden! Er ist wahrhaftig auferstanden. Halleluja! How are you today? I have missed so many of you who decided not to come to church on Sundays! I do hope you are able to watch us on YouTube or on our website.

My family and I are doing well, after a few days off in the "post Holy Week time", thank God!

The 40-day journey has ended. Christ's humiliation, suffering and death has turned into His exaltation, His victory over death and Satan. You have been given a new beginning with the risen Lord. **Eastertide** or **Paschaltide** is the period of 50 days, spanning from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. It is celebrated as a joyful feast. Each Sunday of the season is treated as a Sunday of Easter. Eastertide is a festal season in the liturgical year of Christianity that focuses on celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

As the season of spring brings us a total renewal of life with nature "waking up" from a long winter with new colours, the trees starting to bud and bloom, the flowers...well, not quite yet, at least here in Alberta! But still, spring has sprung and so also our new life in Christ has seen a renewal with His resurrection. We just celebrated this fact on Easter Sunday, which, we could say, is the most joyous Sunday of the year. We had to endure a long journey of 40 days to hold on to our shouts of "alleluias". Even in our Lutheran liturgy, we have temporarily suspended

the use of this precious expression of worship and saved it for THE Sunday of Christ's victory.

Yes, renewal, new life, plants and flowers blooming, trees budding, spring cleaning, new beginnings, the sun shining after the storm, the dawn breaking after a long and dark night, Jesus conquering death, it all reminds me a bunch of scripture readings. The apostle Paul says it this way: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.". 2 Cor 5:17

My task as your pastor, is to bring you always God's comfort and His Word, and so I pray that the Easter message may fill your hearts with renewed joy, no matter what circumstances. This message of life and hope in the midst of a global crisis is much needed. It has been proclaimed in our church since 1913! April is the month of **our church's 108th anniversary** and we thank God that He has blessed us so far. God is still the same and His message of Life and hope has never changed nor will it ever!

God's peace ("shalom") and love ("agape") be with you! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! A very blessed (and joyful) Eastertide!

NOTE ABOUT THE PANDEMIC:

We at SMLC continue to be cautious and try to follow the protocols to protect each other. We thank God for the fact that we are still able to come to church for worship and some fellowship, even when all looks different. By promoting this as best as we can, we try to keep God's three first Commandments.

NEWS FROM SMLC.

1 – QUESTIONNAIRE: We want to thank all of you who have expressed your opinions on our questionnaire and returned it by the established deadline. Your thoughts on our Mission & Ministry are very important for us to plan ahead for the future of this congregation. The results will be shared on our retreat. Please read next announcement below.

2 – ONLINE MISSION & MINISTRY RETREAT: As you already know, we are inviting every member to participate in our first Mission & Ministry retreat that we will offer on zoom on April 24 @ 10 a.m. It is planned for our members only, this time. Your participation as a member of SMLC is extremely important and we hope to get a good attendance on that Saturday. Please mark this on your calendar.

3 – **ONLINE BIBLE STUDIES:** We are resuming our online bible study on Zoom every Wednesday (except when there's a fifth Wednesday), at 7 p.m.

Elizabeth Schieman is leading the study on the gospels ("Life and Times of Jesus") every first and third Wednesday. I am leading the study "who are we, Lutherans?" every second and fourth Wednesday. Call our office or me (pastor) if you need the login info. I plan to send the login info every Wednesday through our email list. I found out it's way better to send it on the day of the Bible study then some days in advance. It's very easy to forget!

4 - PRAYER REQUESTS: Send us your prayer requests. We have a "prayer chain" where a group of people (the "prayer warriors") pray for your needs.

5 – **ISOLATION: LONGLINESS & DEPRESSION:** During this pandemic, social isolation can give way to feelings of loneliness, depression, and hopelessness. 6 – ONLINE COFFEE FELLOWSHIP: Since we will meet for our online retreat on the 24th, we will not have our virtual coffee hour in April.

7 – CONGREGATIONAL MEETING: We held our online triannual congregational meeting on March 21 with 24 participants. We had a presentation from the Historic Society with City of Calgary Representative: Asia Walker, from Heritage Calgary. She outlined procedures and requirements on how to apply for and receive formal recognition as a municipal historical site. Character defining elements, such as organ, pews, windows, and brick work, would be part of a bylaw which cannot be changed and which would obligate us to repair and restore elements to historic qualifications. Funds typically must be used to restore bylaw items. Congregation must raise 50% of the project costs.

We also spoke about how badly we need more members to be involved. We ask you to, prayerfully consider participating more in the work of the church. There are open positions and need for more volunteers ("servers"): IT committee, vicechairman, stewardship board, Lutheran Hour ambassador, counters, ushers, properties, etc.

Many other important matters were discussed and approved. If you are interested in reading the minutes from that meeting, please call our office and ask Andrea for a copy that is available to all members.

FOR CHILDREN: A SUMMARY OF THE BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

(in a very simple language)

LEVITICUS

The Book of Leviticus is the third book of the Bible. It is in the Old Testament and it's about the law of God. The law teaches us that God is holy. The Book of Leviticus contains many rules for the Hebrew people. But we do not obey all the rules in Leviticus today, because we trust Jesus (see Galatians 3:23-25).

The Book of Leviticus also describes the duties of priests during the time of the Old Testament. And, in Leviticus 23, there is a list of special holidays, when the Hebrew people praised God together.

God also told the people that they must kill animals. And, they gave these animals to God. The people did this so that God would forgive their evil deeds (Leviticus chapters 1-7). This teaches us why Jesus had to die. Jesus died so that today, God forgives our evil deeds. Evil deeds are called "sins". We must confess our sins to God. And we must invite God into our lives.
