Happy New Year, everybody! Ein gesegnetes neues Jahr!

I am back with my first (news)letter in 2022, hoping that this year will be filled with good news, full of joy and peace, lots of blessings! We keep asking that God will deliver us from this lingering and tiring global pestilence. It has now affected our own household: our son Lucas got this omicron and is still in isolation as I write these lines. This should be over soon. My wife Thais, my daughter Melissa and myself tested negative. Thanks for your prayers for our family.

We had a busy (but blessed) end of year, a "Christmastide" filled with lots of opportunities to thank God for sending Jesus to us to be our Saviour. We had two midweek evening services: The Advent service at church and Epiphany service on Zoom. We had ten services in a week, including two "Christmas Eves". Some people (members and non-members) attended church online, others at church. The weather was not inviting at all to leave the comfort of our homes, since it was a very long "cold snap" (a stratospheric polar or arctic vortex, to be more scientific) that hit North America in December and into the first week of January. Our youth group celebrated the "twelve days of Christmas" with short online meetings. They had daily devotions and little gift exchange.

As a congregation, we haven't planned very different things for 2022 since it all depends of this Covid pandemic. This year we will plan ahead for next year's 110th anniversary! We will continue to live-stream our worship services, hoping to reach those who, either don't feel comfortable in coming to church or are in isolation, in homes or even far away. We will continue to have our Bible studies online, as well as our board meetings. We hope we will be able to continue gathering at church and having fellowship in the in-person services.

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And, speaking of the pandemic, have you noticed that all variants of this virus have the name of a letter from the Greek alphabet? It started with Alfa (A α), first discovered in the UK. Then the Beta (B β), first discovered in South Africa. Then Gamma ($\Gamma \gamma$), first discovered in Brazil. Then Delta ($\Delta \delta$), first discovered in India. So far, it's all in "alphabetical order". Following the logic, the next letter to Delta should have been the Epsilon (E ϵ), but instead, the current variant is now the Omicron (O o), first discovered in South Africa. Omicron is the 15th letter of the Greek alphabet. Why the use of Greek letters? And why were other letters left out? Well, according to what I have read, the World Health Organization named it this way to avoid confusion and stigma. The other Greek letters are being used for minor variants and don't make the news. Those that "make the news" are the "variants of significance". Only two letters won't be used in this system: the letter "Nu" (N v), for example, remembers the word "new" in English. The letter "Chi" may be confused with the name of China's president, Xi Jinping.

Now, you may ask, what's my point? Well, still thinking of the Greek alphabet, the holy name of Jesus Christ (whose Sunday we celebrated on January 9) was represented by the 22^{nd} letter, the "Chi" (X) and the 17^{th} letter, the "Rho" (looks like a "P" but it's pronounced as an "R"). The **Chi Rho** is one of the earliest forms of christogram, formed by superimposing the first two (capital) letters— chi and rho (**XP**)—of the Greek word **XPI** Σ TO Σ (Christos) in such a way that the vertical stroke of the rho intersects the center of the chi. You must have seen this symbol in churches, paraments, furniture etc.

So, the letter Chi (represented as an "X") is indeed important...maybe not for the pandemic nomenclature, but for us. On that note, next time when you complain every time when people abbreviate "Christmas" with "Xmas", remember that there is nothing wrong with that. The "X" represents Christ anyways. Nobody "took Christ away" by writing like this, even if this was the intention. So, I hope you had a merry "Xmas".



The Chi-Rho symbol was used by the Roman Emperor Constantine (306–337 AD) as part of a military standard. Constantine's standard was known as the Labarum.

The Jesus of Nazareth we know from Scripture, was born in Bethlehem, Judea, we just celebrated his birth. He grew up in Nazareth, Galilea



and died in Jerusalem, Judea. Much more than "the son of a carpenter", He was man and God. "On the third day, he rose from the dead and ascended into heaven". He could

only do this because he was the anointed Son of God, the CHRIST ("Christos"). Jesus Christ is the holy name with which we start another new year, the name in whom we were baptized, the name that was used engraved on Constantine's ropes under this symbol (Constantine's monogram). He is God, the Son who was at the beginning, before the foundation of the universe. And here we remember other two Greek letters: He said of himself: "I am the **ALPHA** and the **OMEGA**", the beginning and the end (the first and the last letters). Revelation 22:13

He promises to be with us, to walk with us through another new year. He said: "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matth 28:20).

Amen.



Here is a summary of the letter: PRE-CONVENTION BULLETIN #1

CONVENTION DATES: The Twelfth Regular Convention of Lutheran Church–Canada will meet from June 10-13, 2022. CONVENTION LOCATION: The convention will be held at the Delta Hotels Edmonton South Conference Centre in Edmonton, Alberta. CONVENTION THEME: The theme for the convention is Stand Firm In The Faith. It is based on 1 Corinthians 16:13 and was chosen for our convention that was originally scheduled for 2021 in recognition of the 500th Anniversary of Martin Luther's famous 'Here I Stand' speech at the Diet of Worms in 1521. Although our convention is being held a year later, the same theme has been retained since standing firm in the faith is probably more necessary now than ever as a result of Covid-19 ramifications.

Some important dates for congregations:

February 10, 2022 Deadline for congregations to return to the Synod office the Nomination Forms for President, Vice-President, and Regional Pastor **March 10, 2022** Deadline for congregations to return to the Synod office the Nomination Form for Circuit Counsellor

March 12, 2022 Deadline for congregations to return to the Synod office the Appointment Form for Pastor and Lay Delegates from the congregation.



DIE DEUTSCHE ECKE: WAS BEDEUTET EPIPHANIAS?

Epiphanias, Epiphania, Epiphanie ("Erscheinung") bzw. **Epiphaniasfest** ist der ursprüngliche und heute noch in der evangelischen Kirche gebräuchliche Name eines am 6. Januar begangenen Festes im Christentum; Es wird als "Fest der Erscheinung des Herrn: Epiphanias" bezeichnet.

In der katholischen und Lutherischen Kirchen wird es als Hochfest der **Erscheinung des** Herrn bezeichnet und in vielen Kalendern auch

als **Dreikönigsfest**, **Dreikönigstag**, **Heilige Drei Könige** und **Heiligedreikönigstag**, In Österreich wird dieser Tag auch *Weihnachtszwölfer* genannt. Diese Bezeichnung leitet sich vermutlich von dem alten Brauchtum ab, das Weihnachtsfest zwölf Tage lang zu begehen, wovon der letzte Tag das Fest der Erscheinung des Herrn war.

Das Fest wird von den Westkirchen der Anbetung des Kindes durch die Weisen aus dem Morgenland zugeordnet. In den orthodoxen Kirchen ist es das Hochfest der Taufe des Herrn und der Offenbarung der allerheiligsten Dreiheit.
