The word "agape" has its roots in ancient Greek. In the context of the New Testament, "agape" ( $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$ ) refers to a selfless, sacrificial, unconditional love. It is often used to describe the love that God has for humanity and the love that Christians are called to have for one another.

In classical Greek, "agape" was a general term for love, but it took on a deeper, more profound meaning in Christian theology. Unlike other Greek words for love, such as "eros" (romantic love) and "philia" (brotherly love), "agape" is characterized by its self-giving nature and its focus on the well-being of others.

The concept of "agape" is central to Christian teachings and is exemplified in passages such as 1 Corinthians 13, which describes the qualities of true love, and John 3:16, which speaks of God's love for the world.

In summary, "agape" represents the highest form of love, one that is selfless, unconditional, and rooted in the divine.

Not bad, eh? May this true love of God, the kind that is unchangeable and unconditional, fill your heart and guide you through this month of February. God truly loves you!

**Cease-fire agreement:** We got this letter from the Canadian Lutheran World Relief:



Dear Friends,

The news of a ceasefire in Gaza has filled CLWR and our partners with hope. Those same partners have laboured for 15 months to get aid to families in Gaza through any means possible. Calgary got through, and it made a difference for thousands. But so many more in Gaza went without food, shelter, medicine or clean water because the horrors of war made it impossible to reach them. Now, we have the opportunity to reach them.

Since the onset of the war, at least 45,000 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza, and over 100,000 injured in violence. 59% of the victims are women, children and the elderly. The healthcare system, targeted by violence, has been devastated. 90% of Gaza's population of 2.2m was displaced by violence in just over a year. So many of them are desperate for help, and acting now could save lives.

Our partners at Lutheran World Federation Jerusalem have already been in touch, indicating they are ready to move immediately with whatever we can fund. Now that a ceasefire is in place, from their base of operations in Jerusalem, they'll be able to provide immediate treatment for sick and injured patients, help rehabilitate the healthcare system in Gaza, provide trauma support, and distribute winter clothes,

food parcels, blankets, and hygiene kits.

I'm touched by the generosity Lutherans in Canada showed in response to this crisis as it unfolded. Please, if you're able, consider making a gift at this critical window now that humanitarian access has been restored. Thank you for continuing to pray with us for justice and peace.

OECC became a member of LCC "by being committed itself to the true teaching and authority of the Scripture". They established a fundraiser to build their own church. 

# NOW, FROM THE HOSPITAL MINISTRIES

Many of you may know about Lutheran Hospital Ministries but for those of you who don't, let me tell you about us. Lutheran Hospital Ministries was started in Calgary in 1975 to provide for a need in the hospitals. Lutheran Hospital Ministries helps the ill, injured and lonely people in hospitals, hospices and long-term care centres. We bring Jesus' healing and strength to where people are at. Our visitors get trained and provided with brochures

from Lutheran Hospital Ministries to leave with these folks. Our dedicated visitors usually go to one or more places every week meeting with people. The ministers involved with our society provide services in the long-term care centres for the patients/clients and even the staff. Staff also struggle with the loss of someone that they've cared for over the years. Staff also struggle with amount of work that has to be done and delivering the kind of care they want to deliver.

Lutheran Hospital Ministries is entirely funded by individuals and local and rural congregations in Southern Alberta with some grants from the Lutheran Women's Missionary League – Canada (LWML-C) and some corporate sponsorship. This year we had help from Capital Power's "Empower" grant program and our banking service provider, Christian Credit Union. Every year we host the Annual Walk, Run and Roll for Love at Confederation Park. Walkers collect funds to walk 5 km on a spring morning. That means they can expect any kind of weather on a given year. We also need to thank St. Matthew Lutheran Church who allows us to operate in a room in the office for the past several years. St. Matthew also allows us to host our training and education sessions for anyone who's interested.

Most importantly, we depend on prayers from everyone. This is a faith-based operation and God has provided to us for 50 years so we can serve His will to all people in need. We will visit anyone who requests a visit, an active Lutheran or not. It is estimated that we have served about 250,000 people over the past 50 years. To give Glory to God, we will be hosting a  $50^{\rm th}$  Anniversary service at St. Matthew Lutheran Church on October 18, 2025 followed by a German style luncheon with music from "Cross" Country. Guess what, you are all invited to join us.

Like any society, we go through ups and down. During the pandemic, visiting was not allowed. In the fall of 2022, we were finally allowed back into these sites to provide visits. Because of the 2-and-a-half-year break, we lost a lot of visitors and we basically had to start over again. In 2024, we managed to double our active visitors and to bring on two more Pastors to help us. The requests for visits and services currently exceeds our capacity to supply all the long-term sites. This year our visitors visited over 3700 people, donated 653 hours of time and provided 160 worship services at care centres.

Some of our bigger goals in the near future is training more visitors and recruiting some Pastors in rural Alberta so they can serve their local communities. We are also looking to print large print hymnals for the Pastors to take to their worship services. We have recently got polo shirts printed for our visitors (supplied by Christian Credit Union). When our visitors go in to visit someone, they must be asked by that person. By having our logo and message on the shirts, other people can ask our visitors for a visit because they know who we are. Another idea is to update our website and adding new features and more training opportunities to the site. We would also like folks to be able to get comforting brochures online and to maybe watch some short devotional videos given by our Director of Pastoral Care directly on their phone at anytime they need.
