Hello again, peace and joy in Jesus! We are having **Confirmation** this year!

I thought I would elaborate on this topic for this issue. We haven't had the confirmation rite since Abril 2019 among us. After two years of studying the Small Catechism (M. Luther, 1529) and the Bible, we will welcome five kids on April 2nd (Palm Sunday) as our new communicant members (members of the church who are eligible to take Holy communion)! They are **Salma Herchen, Melissa Zeuch, Jordan Felde, John and Emily Pfeifer.** It will be a total of twenty kids that I had the blessing to confirm since I was installed as your pastor at SMLC. I want to take this opportunity to thank our two volunteer teachers for the faithful and tireless teaching during this period, **Koreen Graumann** and **Heather Graham-Navis**. We are so blessed to have these volunteers to do this important job, that, in many churches, is done by the pastor. They can now "rest from their labors". Mission accomplished! You sure did a great job!

Now, I know that most of you, dear readers, were confirmed in the past...you come to receive the body and blood of Christ at the altar, so you must be a confirmed member. My confirmation was back in 1976 in Brazil, which sounds like ancient history to my kids! I was confirmed by my father. It doesn't matter how long ago you had your confirmation day. Let me ask you a few questions: Do you know the date you were



confirmed? The name of the church and the pastor who confirmed you? Next question: Do you still remember and hold dear to your heart your confirmation Bible verse that you were supposed to keep for your entire life? If you forgot, please go ahead, and do some digging and find out what is your confirmation verse. It should be always guiding you through life's journey.

My next question to you: Do you really know why we have confirmation in the Lutheran Church? What is the purpose of it? Allow me to help you by having us all think about this Christian rite. Just to clarify, it was not ordained by God in Scripture, nor is it a sacrament.

What happens in confirmation?

Confirmation means "saying yes". In confirmation God's promise to the individual made at baptism is confirmed: God confirms his promise to be with the baptised always and he or she receives the blessing and a special greeting from the church in the form of a Bible verse that is thought of as a kind of life companion. Confirmation is not a sacrament in the Evangelical Lutheran Church but a rite that also marks the passage from childhood to youth.

Preparing for confirmation

Confirmation presupposes baptism and a time of preparation. Together with his or her classmates or other teenagers from the parish the candidate for confirmation meets with a pastor or another teacher once a week for two school years to learn about the Christian faith and to talk about life's big questions and about what it means to believe in God. Confirmation is something you choose and not something you need to celebrate if you have been baptised as a child. It is not a condition to be saved!

Part of the church service

Confirmation usually takes place during the church service on special Sundays during spring. Traditionally, the Christian churches have done baptisms and confirmations on Palm Sunday, as we are doing as well this year (April 2nd). After the ceremony in the church, most families gather to celebrate. Note that this is NOT a graduation, where the 'student' is now ready with his/her obligations and leaves the school, going away for life. The confirmed kids are invited to STAY in church, to be an active member of our fellowship, to have a living relationship with God.

After the day of Confirmation

They are now eligible to take Holy Communion with all other communicant members of the church. They are also encouraged to join the youth group of our church. The congregation expects them to be faithful to their vows, after all, they will be promising to be faithful to God all of their lives.

We wish our five children God's richest blessings as they take this important step in their faith journey, so that they may walk with Jesus for the rest of their lives.

As for you, member of our congregation, please welcome these kids and encourage them to keep coming to church, they need your support! To finalize, remember the promises you made at the altar when you were confirmed in your Christian faith. Amen.

from last issue) of our rich history, in chronological order:

- 1953 (May) Basement completely excavated to provide more room for the auditorium.
- 1955 (Dec.) Rev. Fred Stark serves as pastor until 1988.
- 1956 (Nov.) Carillonic bells installed.
- 1958 (May) Neon Cross placed on spire.
- 1959 (Fall) Modern Kitchen built and more Sunday school rooms provided.
- 1959 (Fall) Robert Holst serves as vicar until July 1960.
- 1960 (Jan.) Name officially changed to "ST. MATTHEW" Lutheran Church.
- 1960 (Fall) Parents' room provided.
- 1962 (June) East balcony built to accommodate choirs and pipe organ.
- 1962 (July) Pipe organ purchased.
- 1962 (Sept) Otto Brillinger served as a vicar until July of 1963.
