The season after Pentecost begins the

day after Pentecost and ends with midday prayer on the Saturday before the First Sunday in Advent.

The Sundays after Pentecost make up the longest portion on the Church Year. This is the Time of the Church – the time we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity.

On the first Sunday after Pentecost, the church celebrates Holy Trinity Sunday. We are baptized into only one name, but that name is "of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit". There is only one name, only one God – but there are three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. On this Sunday, we confess the great mystery of the Holy Trinity.

The Sundays of this time of the church Year are known as Sundays after Pentecost (or Sundays after Trinity). Picking up on Pentecost as the season of growth, they are often referred to as the Green Sundays. The readings focus on the life of Christ in His church. We hear Jesus' teaching His disciples and healing the faithful.

Because the Pentecost season is part of "ordinary" time, congregations may choose to observe some of the lesser festivals of the season. When saint days or commemorations fall on Sundays, worship leaders could highlight these to offer teaching moments about the breadth of the church's life and work. These noteworthy days enable Christians to reflect on how we worship "with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven."

On the Last Sunday after Pentecost, the church gives voice to the joyful hope of the second coming of Jesus for the resurrection of the dead and the last judgement. The end-times focus of the Last Sunday of the Church Year bears themes of hope and preparation that are similar to those in Advent, which soon follows.

During the Time of the Church, we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity.

Readings: Acts 2:41-47; Ephesians 3:14-19; Ephesians 1:15-23; Colossians 3:12-17

PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

• The church is decorated in green, the colour of growing plants. This marks the season of growth in living our Baptism and receiving the Lord's Word and Sacraments

• On Trinity Sunday, we confess the Athanasian Creed, which goes into great detail to confess the catholic (universal) faith that must be faithfully and firmly believed to be saved: "That we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity."

DER ALTE UND DER NEUE MENSCH – IN EINFACHER SPRACHE

Wir lesen im Neuen Testament dreimal vom "alten Menschen" (Röm 6,6; Eph 4,22; Kol 3,9) und dreimal vom "neuen Menschen" (Eph 2,15; Eph 4,24; Kol 3,10). Wenn man alle diese Stellen liest, erkennt man: Der "alte Mensch" wurde von Gott mit Christus

gekreuzigt, und der "neue Mensch" wurde von Gott geschaffen. Christen haben den "alten Menschen" ausgezogen und den "neuen Menschen" angezogen. Doch wie kann man das alles verstehen?

Der "alte Mensch": Das ist das, was einen Sünder ausmacht. Es ist die Summe von bösen Eigenschaften: lügen, stehlen, betrügen und so weiter. Alle Menschen ohne Gott sind so. Man spricht vom "alten Menschen", weil es so ein böses Leben schon seit Adam gibt. Am Kreuz auf Golgatha hat Gott die Sünde an Jesus Christus gerichtet. So ist der "alte Mensch" mit Christus gekreuzigt worden. Gott hat das verurteilt, was wir als Sünder *sind*. Wenn wir an den Herrn Jesus glauben, gilt das auch für uns persönlich. Wir haben bei unserer Bekehrung den "alten Menschen" ausgezogen. Wir wollten das Böse nicht mehr tun, wollten nicht mehr wie Sünder leben. Daran müssen wir jeden Tag denken. Und wenn wir doch wieder etwas Böses tun, müssen wir es schnell wieder ablegen.

Der "neue Mensch". Das ist das, was jemand ausmacht, der aus Gott geboren ist. Es ist die Summe aller guten Eigenschaften: Freundlichkeit, Großzügigkeit, Treue und so weiter. Man spricht von einem "neuen Menschen", weil es neu war, so zu leben. Der Herr Jesus hat vollkommen gelebt, ganz anders als alle vor ihm. Nach seinem Tod und seiner Auferstehung hat er allen Gläubigen sein Leben und seinen Geist gegeben. Damit wurde der neue Mensch geschaffen. Bei unserer Bekehrung haben wir den neuen Menschen angezogen. Wir wollten nun als Heilige und Gerechte leben. Daran müssen wir jeden Tag denken und immer wieder das Gute anziehen, das Gute tun.

Der alte Mensch: So wie Sünder leben seit Adam an. Der neue Mensch: So wie die Gläubigen leben, nachdem der Herr Jesus gestorben und auferstanden ist.
